### Trout Stocking and Habitat Improvements



This spring, I had the opportunity to join officials with the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) and Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) to help with trout stocking on Havens Run in Norwich Township and visit PGC's habitat project in State Game Lands 30 on Potato Creek Road. Hunting and fishing are among the many outdoor opportunities that help make our region a great place to live. Thanks to PFBC Executive Director Tim Schaeffer and PGC Executive Director Stephen Smith and their teams for organizing this collaborative stocking event.

### Game Commission OKs Additional Sundays for Hunting

Following passage of a state law that lifted the ban on Sunday hunting in the Commonwealth, the Pennsylvania Board of Game Commissioners met in July and approved 10 additional Sundays for hunting for the 2025-26 season.

Every Sunday from Sept. 14 through Dec. 7 will now be open for hunting. The dates reflect all Sundays that fall within established hunting seasons, with the exception of migratory game bird seasons, which are set through federal frameworks.

### Kane Fish and Game Club Earns Grant

There is great news to share for area sportsmen and women as the Kane Fish and Game Club was recently awarded a \$50,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Game Commission through the 2025 Pennsylvania Shooting Range Improvement Program.

The program provides funding to increase opportunity, access and safety at sportsmen's clubs throughout the Commonwealth. This initiative also provides the ability to host Hunter-Trapper Education classes and workshops in more locations. This is the second year for this program, and 10 projects were selected from across the state this year.





## Agricultural Deer Program Changes Adopted

The Pennsylvania Game Commission adopted four changes to the agency's agricultural deer control permit program, which allows farmers to address deer damage through hunters harvesting additional antlerless deer on enrolled farms and in longer hunting seasons. The program aims to expand accessibility to agricultural deer depredation programs and provide opportunities to hunters.

Most notably, the rule limiting hunters to four agricultural deer permits, also known as "ag tags" or "red tags," to harvest antlerless deer for any particular property is removed. Additionally, the timeframe during which the tags can be used is more than doubled. A brief closure will be held during the peak of fawning season in spring and early summer.

With ag tags now permitted during regular deer seasons, hunters using those tags will be limited to using the sporting arms allowed in those seasons. Otherwise, hunters may use any lawful sporting arm.

Finally, those who apply to enroll their farms in the program will be required only to certify they are the owner or lessee of both the agricultural interest adversely affected by deer damage and the hunting rights to be covered by the permit. Previously, to be eligible, applicants had to supply a deed or a lease agreement.



## 2024 Bear Harvest

The Pennsylvania Game Commission announced 2,642 bears were taken during the various seasons in 2024.

Hunters took bears in 56 of the state's 67 counties and 21 of 22 Wildlife Management Units (WMUs). Hunters got bears in all seasons, too. The traditional statewide firearms bear season contributed the most to the harvest at 823. The archery season added 756, the extended season 425, the muzzleloader and special firearms season 634, and the early archery season four.

The largest harvested was a 774-pounder taken in the statewide regular bear season in Monroe County in November. Two other bears harvested exceeded 700 pounds, while six others topped 600 pounds.

Totals for bears taken in our area are as follows: Potter, 109; McKean, 78; and Cameron, 56.



## Elk License Changes

At its meeting in April, the Pennsylvania Game Commission's board approved several changes to the state's elk license application system.

Among the changes most sought by hunters, no more than 10% of available elk licenses in any given year will be awarded to nonresidents. Previously, there was no limit, and while the percentage of tags going to nonresidents typically had been about 10%, it has increased in recent years to as high as 13%, which drew concern from resident hunters.

Also, beginning on Jan. 1, 2026, any applicant who draws a bull elk tag will be ineligible to apply for a bull tag ever again. However, they will be able to apply for a cow tag. Also, this limitation does not apply to the Special Conservation Elk Licenses auctioned and raffled off by the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and Keystone Elk Country Alliance, respectively.

Other changes approved by the commission include:

- All hunters will be required to first buy a hunting license before applying for an elk tag.
- Hunters no longer will be required to include their Social Security numbers or hunter ID numbers on applications. Because a hunting license will be needed to apply, that information already will be in the licensing system.
- The elk tag drawing will occur electronically moving forward, and the regulation was reworded to reflect this change.
- Hunters who draw an elk tag are no longer required to participate in an elk hunting orientation program.

## Attention First-Time Hunters!

Hunter-Trapper Education courses are required for all first-time hunters and trappers before they can buy a license in the Commonwealth. The Pennsylvania Game Commission offers both in-person and online options.

The course covers responsible hunting behavior, firearms basics and safety, basic shooting, wildlife conservation and management, outdoor safety and survival, hunting techniques, trapping and furtaking basics, and hunting safety.

The following options are available:

- ✓ PGC's Basic Hunter-Trapper Education In-Person Course is offered free of charge to anyone age 11 and older. Classes are held in various locations across the Commonwealth. A schedule is available at [www.pgc.pa.gov](http://www.pgc.pa.gov).
- ✓ This interactive online version of PGC's Basic Hunter-Trapper Education Course is offered to Pennsylvania residents age 11 and older. The fee for this course is \$49.95.

- ✓ The National Rifle Association offers a free online hunter education course to Pennsylvania residents age 11 and older.

## Hunters Sharing the Harvest

Did you know Pennsylvania has a venison donation program to help families in need?

Each season, Hunters Sharing the Harvest (HSH) aims to donate over 100,000 pounds of venison to the state's food banks, which then re-distribute it to more than 5,000 local provider charities such as food pantries, missions, homeless shelters, Salvation Army facilities and churches.

Since 1991, HSH has coordinated the processing and distribution of approximately 2.5 million pounds of donated venison. An average-sized deer will provide enough high-protein, low-fat meat for 200 servings. Thanks to program sponsors, hunters can donate venison at no charge.
